BEHAVIOR POLICY

Main Goal:

Apply the regulation to help improve the school's performance.

Why do we need the behavior policy?

- Contribute to the achievement of the vision of the United Arab Emirates.
- Meet requirements of the School Inspection Framework in terms of behavior.
- Reinforce the value of positivity within the school environment.
- Achieve the requirements of the society in creating a conscious generation of its future responsibilities towards local and global issues.

CONDUCT MARKS

60 marks is minimum expected conduct mark: and gives students the opportunity to compensate for marks lost throughout the term. Students are eligible for good conduct marks either by demonstrating outstanding behavior or by avoiding the repetition of violations and committing to positive behavior.

- If the student's behavior level drops below 60 marks at the end of the semester, their certificate is withheld.
- Conduct carries an overall weight of 100 marks calculated per term to reflect the sum of overall positive and/or outstanding behavior.

80 marks of positive behavior: All students are expected to get it at the beginning of each term. These are deducted accordingly under the following categories:

- Low-impact first degree violations: 4 marks are deducted per violation.
- Medium-impact violations of the second degree: 8 marks are deducted per violation.
- High-impact third degree violations: 12 marks are deducted per violation.
- Very high-impact, fourth degree violations: 20 marks are deducted per violation.

20 marks of outstanding behavior:

- These marks are awarded based on the following criteria that assess learners' personal qualities:
- Personal Development.
- Appreciation of the values of Islam and respect the identity, heritage and culture of the UAE and the cultures of the world.

PROCEDURES TO DEAL WITH VIOLATIONS

Suspend the student from classes inside the school. Guide and counsel the student for no more than 3 weeks. Follow up and report progress made in student behavior. 	 Refer the case to the Educational Committee to take the decision of suspension. Suspend the student from school until investigations are complete. Refer the student to a professional facility for behavior management for a period of 1 - 2 weeks. Deduct marks. Call the parent to sign the form expressing the school interest in non-renewal of registration for the next year. 	 Suspend the student as per the decision of the Educational Committee. Ask the parent to transfer the student to another school. Transfer the student to another school upon cooperation of the parent and the Private Schools office. 	 Register the violation as fourth degree as decided by the Educational Committee. Suspension from all government schools as decided by the concerned authorities. Refer the student to behavior modification facilities. Decide on the student re-registration in cooperation with concerned authorities.

- Fail the student in conduct.
- Call the parent for an immediate meeting.
 Take immediate action in cooperation with the concerned authorities.
- Hold a decision-making meeting for the Educational Committee and inform the counselor of their decision.
 Suspend the student from school until investigations are complete.
 Hold the student and parent responsible for damages if any.

- Refer the student to a rehabilitation facility.
- Withdraw the student from school and hold his/her education until treatment is complete in case all support strategies have failed.
- Also, refer the student to a behavior modification facility.
 Suspend the student permanently in case all support strategies have failed.
